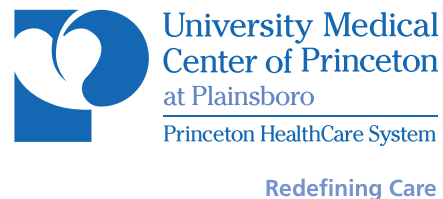

Safe Patient Handling

Total Body Lifts

Total body lifts are for those individuals who are unable to get out of their bed and into a chair. With this device, you will be cradled and lifted in a sitting position to a chair.



Standing and Raising Aid (SARA)

SARA is for those who have difficulty standing or walking. This device has a sling around the chest and a strap around the knee to safely assist you when getting from the bed to a chair or a bedside commode.



Standing Support Aid (Stedy)

Stedy is another device that helps when you have difficulty walking, but can stand. It allows you to move in a semi-seated position.



Lateral Transfer Devices

When you need to be moved from a bed to a stretcher or radiological table, a board is used to help slide you from the bed to the other surface. This device promotes your safety as well as that of the staff.
